MESSAGE FROM OUR CENTER DIRECTOR

Dear Friends,

The Wanamaker Cottage turns 150!

As you may have heard, this year we are celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the Main House - The Wanamaker Cottage. There is such a rich history in Cape May and Cape May Point and John Wanamaker is right in the middle of that history, especially here in Cape May Point.

Anthony Fucci The Wanamaker "cottage", which originally stood on Beach Avenue (lost to the sea) and was later moved to its present location on the corner of Cape & Yale Aves., was donated by John Wanamaker to the Presbyterian Orphanage of Philadelphia, a.k.a. Sunny Corner, in 1916.

Little side story - when I arrived here in 1999 the Main House was battleship

gray - after a few years we decided it was time to change the color - so we formed a committee and chose yellow. Unbeknownst to us that was the original color of the house, hence the name Sunny Corner!

It remained an orphanage until 1959. In 1962, the Marianists acquired the property for a summer retreat for the Brothers & Priests. By the late 1960s the houses were not really being used as originally intended by the Marian-

ists, so a petition was made to the Provincial Council to convert the buildings to a retreat center. 1970 was the first official Summer Family Retreat and it all just grew from that point onward!



John Wanamaker, a prominent Philadelphia merchant and founder of Wanamaker Department Stores, and William Joseph Chaminade, founder of the Marianists, were both visionaries, though in very different realms. However, their contributions to society intersected in the development of religious and cultural life, particularly in Cape May Point and its broader historical impact.



Wanamaker sought to create a place where religious and recreational life could flourish. He played a crucial role in the establishment of the Sea Grove community at Cape May Point in the late 19th century. His efforts helped transform the area into a center for religious gatherings and retreats. He was deeply involved in creating spaces where people could connect with nature, religion, and leisure in a way that was unique for its time. That is why "the circle" in Cape May Point was created - an open space for people of all faiths to gather.

Chaminade's visionary work revolved around the establishment of schools and religious communities dedicated to educating young people, especially in times of political and social upheaval in France. He founded the Marianists to carry out this mission, believing that education and religious formation were essential to building strong, faithful communities.

Wanamaker's work in Cape May Point, especially in creating a space for spiritual and social engagement, could be seen as complementary to Chaminade's vision of building strong, faith-based communities. Their shared values of improving society through community engagement highlights their roles as visionaries in different fields but with similar goals of creating a better, more thoughtful world.

So, as you can see, we at the Center are carrying out Wanamaker's and Chaminade's visions!

did all the things," said Carli, mom of four grown children who have stopped practicing the Catholic faith. "We went to Mass together. We sent them to Catholic school. They went to youth group. We did everything we thought we were supposed to do. What happened?"

The Catholic Church is facing a spiritual epidemic. A recent study found that only 15% of children raised in Catholic homes will grow up to be faithful Catholic adults. The conventional wisdom about raising Catholic kids doesn't always seem to work, but until recently, no one knew what to do instead. As a result, we've

clung to giving the same old advice to parents (go to Mass, send them to Catholic school and youth ministry, and hope for the best).

Then, when it fails 85% of the time, we chalk it up to our kids' "free will." Of course, that's true - we can't force our children to be faithful adults. But it's cold comfort, and parents need better answers.

While families who successfully raised all of their children to a faithful adulthood did have regular family prayer times (usually some kind of morning, mealtime, and/or bedtime prayers), that doesn't appear to be the main factor responsible for their success. What mattered most was a family dynamic in which the family (especially the children) experienced their faith as the source of the warmth in their homes. Children raised in these households experienced their family's faith as something that *drew them together in good times and bad*.

Of course, these families faced the same stressors and conflicts that all families encounter. Still, they felt their family prayed about these problems in a way that led to better conversations and stronger relationships.

So, obviously, these families just won the spiritual lottery, right? Well, no. The good news is that the things these families do can be taught to any family.

Likewise, other research suggests that the more a family struggles to be happy, healthy or holy, the more they can benefit by cultivating the habits these

> families practice, which fall into three categories: relationship, rituals and reaching out.

In general, families who successfully raised all of their children to a faithful adulthood were intentional about scheduling regular family time and not letting extracurricular activities squeeze out time for things like family meals, a family day or other important family rituals throughout the week.

These families allowed their children to participate in activities in ways that supported their family life rather than competing with it.

Additionally, these families made time to talk about meaningful things like how God was showing up for them or how they could take better care of each other. They scheduled regular mealtimes, family meetings, parent-child dates and other times to make space for real conversation. *Try it!*

May we place no hope in ourselves, but all in God who strengthens us."


